

Home Learning Support - Reading



Read a variety of books at home and listen to your child read their school reading books.
 Engage in a reading activity every day, which could include reading a book aloud, reading on your own, sharing a book with an adult or listening to a story.
 Keep a diary to log all the reading that you have done.
 Keep up to date with what is happening in the world or find out more about topics that interest you by watching Newsround. What did you find out? Is there anything that you need more help with understanding? What else might you want to find out? Do some of your own research.

EYFS	Continue a rhyming string. Hear and say the initial sound in words. Segment the sounds in simple words and blend them together and know which letters represent some of them. Links sounds to letters, naming and sounding the letters of the alphabet. Complete the linked play activities for each book. Ask your child which books they would like to read. Encourage the use of phonics to support with word reading. Talk about the story and ask questions to check understanding. Share some classic children's stories together. Follow the 'read along with tips' for some of the stories and have fun with the rhymes. Hairy Maclary – discuss the rhymes that the author uses for each of the dogs. Rumble in the Jungle – Read the description of the animals to your child and see if they can guess which animal you are describing. Owl Babies – Discuss the feelings of the Owl Babies at different points in the story. Draw and label the Owl Babies in size order.

Re-read the story, miss out the rhyming word and ask your child if they can fill in the gap. Watch author Michael Rosen perform the book. Join in with the chant and copy the actions.</p> <p>Interactive games to help your child to practise their phonics.</p> <p>Sing the ABC phonics song. Try the Phonics Sound Wall to see if your child can pronounce the phonemes, then click to see if you are right. Download the printable resources for further practice.</p>
