

Home Learning Support - Reading



Read a variety of books at home and listen to your child read their school reading books.
 Engage in a reading activity every day, which could include reading a book aloud, reading on your own, sharing a book with an adult or listening to a story.
 Keep a diary to log all the reading that you have done.
 Keep up to date with what is happening in the world or find out more about topics that interest you by watching Newsround. What did you find out? Is there anything that you need more help with understanding? What else might you want to find out? Do some of your own research.

Find a set of instructions for planting a seed or a bean. Read the instructions out aloud. Can you follow the instructions and plant a seed?

Read eBooks which link to your child's age or reading level.

Complete the linked play activities for each book.

Ask your child which books they would like to read. Encourage the use of phonics to support with word reading. Talk about the story and ask questions to check understanding.
